II. IDENTIFY THE AREAS OBSERVED ON THE VISIT:

Community Childcare of Manchester is a nonprofit organization established in 2007. Community Childcare of Manchester offers the following two licensed childcare programs in the community: Storyland Child Care and Carousel Child Care Center. Specifically, Storyland Child Care operates year round Monday through Friday from 5:45am to 6:15pm. The program serves children age infant through school-age. Current enrollment is 52.

Community Childcare of Manchester has a multi-site director that oversees both childcare programs. Vicki Ries has been the multi-site director since August, 2011. Ms. Ries has been with Community Childcare of Manchester for over 28 years and continues to participate in much child development related training. Ms. Ries holds the National Administration Credential and is a member of the NAEYC. Christie Holtz has been with Community Childcare of Manchester for over 24 years. Ms. Holtz continues her work as assistant director, has many years of experience working with children, and continue to participate in much child development related training.

On 10/25/2023, program space was observed.

III. IDENTIFY THE OBSERVED STRENGTHS OF THE CENTER:

Community Childcare of Manchester offers a variety of early learning programming and childcare to help meet the needs of children and families throughout the community. Carousel Child Care Center and Storyland Child Care continue to thrive in a predominantly rural area. During 2023, Community Childcare of Manchester has been celebrating 16 years of providing childcare within the community.

Storyland Child Care has a history of participating in quality initiatives. The program has achieved QRS 4 star and continues to participate in CACFP. Ms. Ries talked about how their program has already begun working towards IQ4K. In 2013, Community Childcare of Manchester received a Distinguished Service Award.

The mission of Community Childcare of Manchester is "...to provide an affordable, safe, developmentally appropriate environment for children. Our focus is to provide a stimulating early care and educational experience, which promotes each child's social/emotional, physical and cognitive development..."

Community Childcare of Manchester is overseen by a board of directors. Ownership and management of Storyland Child Care has remained consistent. The program's management team (e.g. Ms. Ries, Ms. Holtz) is professional and organized, and in turn, daily operations run smoothly. Ms. Ries and Ms. Holtz have systems of organization in place to help ensure administrative items are completed as required and maintained in a secure manner. Management is knowledgeable of licensing guidelines as well as their own program's policies and procedures. Ms. Ries has been a mentor to other child care programs and continues to be open to sharing ideas, joys, and challenges. Ms. Ries has received positive feedback from participating in the Delaware County Economic Development's "Real Life Academy" which has allowed young people an

opportunity to become familiar with the childcare profession. Management has been in the process of updating their written policies and procedures (e.g. handbooks, orientation packet, exposure plan).

Storyland Child Care continues to retain a core team of seasoned employees who are also invested in the local community. Various staff throughout the classrooms reported celebrating 25 years, 24 years, and 23 years of employment with Community Childcare of Manchester. Staff longevity is extremely impressive and congratulatory! Staff participate in annual professional growth hours that exceed minimum guidelines. In the program's vestibule area, there is an area to spotlight employees. The program recognizes the important work staff do in various ways including the "Employee of the Month" award.

Infant room continues to support a "no shoe" policy, support safe sleep practices (including the use of sleep sacks), and provide infants with center-made pureed baby food. Center kitchen continues to be well-organized, well-maintained, and sanitary. The program's culinary expert Barb G has been with the program for several years. Chef Barb G has prior kitchen experience and has obtained a ServSafe Certificate. She is passionate about her work in the kitchen and supports input from classroom staff and children regarding menu items/substitutions served.

Community Childcare of Manchester has emergency plans, policies, and procedures in place which are annually reviewed and updated as needed. Community Childcare of Manchester sites have successfully navigated through several historic Delaware County flooding events, January 2019 Polar Vortex, 2019 health (COVID-19) pandemic and 2023 compromised air quality issues.

Storyland Child Care continues efforts at optimal communication between the program/staff and families. The program has organized parent-staff/program information centers, offers regular program newsletters, utilizes technological communication resources, sponsors a private social media page, and supports family programming activities. A parent board and sign-in/out area has also been established inside the program's main entryway. Information on the parent board includes program reminders as well community resource information.

Building and grounds are well-maintained. Since the last review, outdoor playground cushion surfacing was replaced with shredded rubber. Ms. Ries discussed a future goal of adding an additional area of outdoor sod. Also since the last monitoring visit, classrooms received new changing tables, some new shelving and some new imaginative play centers (e.g. kitchen set). Ms. Ries discussed additional future goals related to floor and countertop replacement. Classrooms continue to be arranged in a thoughtful manner with learning at the forefront. Curriculum continues to include teacher-inspired ideas, phonics work, math concepts, small and large gross motor, imaginative play experiences, and crafts. On-site guest speaker events and off-site field trips are also included in activity planning. Communication between children and staff is done verbally, with picture cues, and through sign language.

Community Childcare of Manchester is invested in the community and continues to collaborate with numerous agencies including Iowa QPPS mentor program, Operation New View, Promise Jobs, Community Services, local businesses, West Delaware Partnership, BDF Empowerment (Preschool Scholarships), local school districts, health professionals, CCR&R and Keystone AEA. The program has been a member of the Manchester Area Chamber of Commerce since 2017. The program has a history of donating Board Books for newborns to the local hospital. Community Childcare of Manchester received a past grant from the Foundation for the Future of Delaware County. Community Childcare of Manchester also received a grant from a partnership between Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque and Morgridge Family Foundation based in Colorado, to "expand and empower child care providers" in a total of six Iowa counties in which the community foundation hosts local affiliate foundations, and can be used in response to challenges such as needing additional cleaning supplies and personal protective equipment; lost revenue due to closures; finding and retaining staff; and decreased enrollment.

In 2019, Community Childcare of Manchester established an endowment fund to encourage, maintain, administer, and acknowledge gifts received from friends of Community Childcare of Manchester. Through an endowment fund Community Childcare of Manchester can grow money through investments with a yearly payout that will be used for daily operational expenses, equipment, and future projects.

Each child is engaged in a daily health check upon arrival for early detection of apparent illness, communicable disease, or unusual condition or behavior which may adversely affect the child or the group. The program has supplies as well as policies and procedures in place for cleaning, disinfecting, and sanitizing. Cleaning checklists and closing duty reminders are posted in various areas of the center. It is noteworthy that this center has extremely pristine and organized storage closets for ease to access to supplies (particularly noted is the storage closet located in Room 4)!

On the day of the monitoring visit, staff were nurturing and attentive to the children's needs. Infant cares (e.g. feeding, changing) were observed. Areas of study included pumpkins, Halloween and fall season. Children have access to an array of materials (e.g. books, imaginative play options, building materials, crafts) that encourage innovative play. Activities throughout the classrooms were many (e.g. outdoor large gross motor play, pumpkin painting, center play experiences, building with Magna Tiles). Staff provided a companionable presence allowing children to have many choices in their

center play experiences. Routine transitions (e.g. clean up activities, snack rituals) worked smoothly into the program's welcoming and cooperative play environment. Staff utilized positive redirection when needed. One example of this was noted in Room 3 as staff facilitated positive usage and sharing of classroom materials. Throughout the classrooms, staff were overheard providing children with many words of encouragement and engaging children in much meaningful discussion. Children responded well to staff and appeared to be truly enjoying their day.
